

### A DAY AT THE SYMPOSIUM

On October 1, 2 and 3 CDCT finally, after a year's delay was able to realize Jane-Marie Law's passion project, the symposium, "Rhythm and Balance: Riding Through the Dressage Levels." This event came about as a result of a grant Jane-Marie wrote to the Dressage Foundation. The foundation generously allowed the grant to extend another year as we slowly creeped out of the "covid cocoon." With Lisa El-Ramey as the clinician, club members and guests gathered at Bettina and Jana Wagner's lovely Easy Gait Farm in Cincinnatus for three days of learning, observing, visiting and feasting. In traditional CDCT style a tasty smorgasbord was laid out for lunch, at least on Saturday, the day this writer was able to attend. There were "dish to pass" gatherings on Friday and Saturday after the days' work and some folks continued on into Monday at another location for more intensive work with Lisa.

Although the day started out pretty chilly, the sun prevailed and by mid-afternoon it was T-shirt weather. The stunning arena was light and airy and a wonderfully comfortable place to spend a day - or more - steeped in dressage culture. On the day I attended rides were organized from training level upwards to Intermediate B, so it was a good day to see and hear about the differences expected of our horses as they move up through the levels.

After lunch Mike Marleau gave a brief, yet energizing talk about hydration for riders - and anyone else. Who knew that by the time you feel thirsty you are actually well past the point where you should have been hydrated? So, we all began the afternoon with a group chant of "drink more water." I wish I could get my mare on board with that when we are away from home.

We then proceeded to the parade of breeds represented in the symposium. We had: (continued)

an Akhal-Teke, a Lusitano, a Morgan, a Brandenburg, a Hanoverian and a Connemara. Each breed's history was described and the owners offered anecdotal comments about their horses. Lisa then pointed out the advantages of each individual as a dressage horse and the way that dressage training might benefit each. Last, but not least, Bettina talked about the Icelandic horses she breeds while Jana and MIke presented two individuals in the arena. I was surprised to learn that Icelandics can have up to five gaits, though that varies from individual to individual. Then, we were back to work.

On Friday the group had talked about the "agreement" we make with our horses. While there was not an explanation of the background of that discussion, it immediately made total sense. Implicit in the name is the fact that we need to recognize what is possible for a horse at any given stage in its training as well as what our half of the bargain might be as the rider/trainer. In other words, If we are to develop to grand prix together, "this is what I understand you need, dear horse, and in turn, this is how I will ride and train you." This was timely for me as I had just begun the slow rehab process with GG Marquez after her long lay-up with a "laminitic episode" this past summer. I had been thinking that now would be a great time to correct some things (in both of us) and come back better than before: hence, our "agreement" which would sound something like: "If I take the time you need to come back strong - and sound - then we will both do this together. "It seems pretty basic, but I had never thought about my working relationship with a horse as an agreement - a two-way street, and I like it.

What follows are some of my notes from the day, in no particular order.

Lisa felt that, in general, many riders are simply not asking for impulsion from their horses. Based on that comment, I spent a good deal of the day watching the stifle and each new horse's use of the back legs and ribcage.

Changing the bend supples the horse and Its not just about the front end.

"The shoulder in and half pass are exactly the same except for the track."

The "Face the bull" exercise asks us to mover the horse around a fixed point in front of horse

Rocking the horse back with the hips helps balance him.

Riding the corners is critical, especially for setting up whatever is coming next.

The rider's torso has three sections: shoulder, mid-section (abs) and hips, all of which can be used independently or together.

When talking about accuracy in a test, it is the "seat and legs that do the talking."

There was a great deal of talk about imagining the feeling of dragging a weight from behind us on the ground. That weight would be attached to our hips/waist.

The rider's calf should be lined up with the center of a circle in corners and on all arcs.

Holding the whip on the shoulder can be helpful in getting the horse to stop dropping his shoulder.

"To feel, we need to whisper with our hands, not shout."

Most of us know we have a good side and a weaker side and we know the same about our horses. So, "quieting the strong side" is the solution, not strengthening the weaker side.

All in all, I had a great day. It was energizing to see so many folks in person once again and it left me hungry to be back to work with my own mare.
